



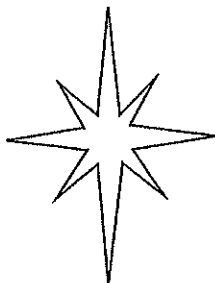

These titles of the coming Christ appeared in daily Vesper antiphons sung during the week before Christmas; their roots date at least to the reign of Charlemagne. Both text and tune are the fruit of 19th-century efforts to reclaim Christian treasures from pre-Reformation sources.

Origins of the Lessons & Carols Service

"A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols" was introduced to King's College in Cambridge, U.K., on Christmas Eve 1918 to offer solace to people who were distressed, exhausted, injured and, in many cases, bereaved at the end of the First World War. This Carol service, and others like it (notably the 12/24 Carol Service at the Cathedral of Truro in 1880) introduced the new college Dean, Eric Milner-White, who had been an Army Chaplain in WWI. Dean Milner-White wanted a different and more positive way of celebrating Christmas for the choir and people in the college. In 1919 he changed the opening hymn/carol to be "Once in Royal David's City" and set the main order and structure of the lessons/readings as it stands as tradition today. It is also a King's College tradition that the opening verse of the hymn be sung by a single treble chorister.

A service of Nine Lessons and Carols features nine Bible readings that tell the Christmas story, interspersed with carols or songs between each reading. This creative telling of scripture and song continues to allow for interpretation and musical variety and an opportunity to encounter the birth of the Savior in this glorious tradition.

"Variations on an Old Basque Noel" arr. Marco Lo Muscio

A Basque folk carol, originally based on 'Angelus Ad Virginem', a 13th or 14th Century Latin carol, it was collected by Charles Bordes and then paraphrased into English by Sabine Baring-Gould, who had spent a winter as a boy in the Basque country. It quotes the biblical account of the Annunciation (Luke, Chapter 1, verses 26-38) and Mary's Magnificat (Luke Chapter 1, verses 46-55) with the opening lines:

*The angel Gabriel from heaven came,
his wings as drifted snow, his eyes as flame;
"All hail", said he, "thou lowly maiden Mary,
most highly favoured lady." Gloria.*

The arranger, Marco Lo Muscio, is an internationally accomplished concert organist and composer. He arranged six variations on this tune; Song, Meditation, Medieval Dance, Ostinato, Pedal Solo, and Song of Gabriel. Each variation showcases varying and exciting colors of this versatile tune. This morning you will hear every variation with the exception of the pedal solo.

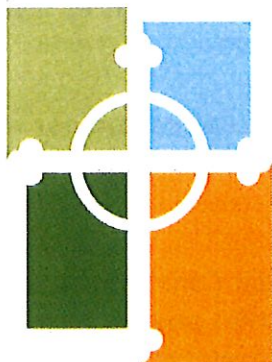

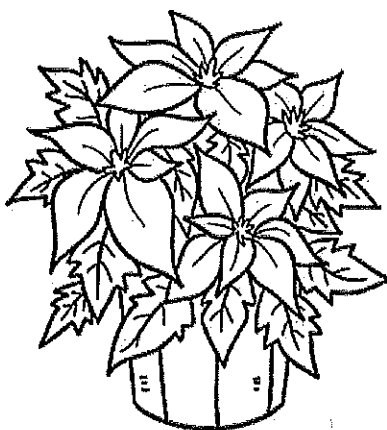
