

While all four gospels identify John the Baptist with the prophecy of Isaiah 40:3, this text (well set to a vigorous Welsh tune) draws on the report of his preaching in Matthew 3:1–12. The final lines recall that he was the first to name Jesus "the Lamb of God" (John 1:29, 36).



Initially a poem for a school assembly at which Booker T. Washington spoke on Lincoln's birthday in 1900, this text and tune have gained national recognition and devotion, not only within the African American community, but also among all who seek liberation from oppression.

MUSIC NOTES

ANTHEM:

"If ye love me" is a four-part motet or anthem by the English composer Thomas Tallis, a setting of a passage from the Gospel of John. First published in 1565 during the reign of Elizabeth I, it is an example of Tudor music and is part of the repertoire of Anglican church music. Prior to the Protestant Reformation, English church music consisted mainly of settings of texts in Latin, such as the Latin Mass, and replaced with prayers, liturgy, and congregational singing in the vernacular. This motet is a noted example of this Reformation compositional style; essentially homophonic, but with some elaboration and imitation. Typically for Anglican motets of this period, it is written in an ABB form, with the second section repeated.

POSTLUDE:

Florence Beatrice Price (1887-1953) was the first black woman to be recognized as a symphonic composer, and the first to have a composition played by a major orchestra. In 2009, a substantial collection of her works and papers were found in an abandoned dilapidated house on the outskirts of St. Anne, Illinois. These consisted of dozens of her scores, including her two violin concertos and her fourth symphony. As Alex Ross stated in The New Yorker in February 2018, "not only did Price fail to enter the canon; a large quantity of her music came perilously close to obliteration". Even though her training was steeped in European tradition, Price's music consists of mostly the American idiom and reveals her Southern roots. She wrote with a vernacular style, using sounds and ideas that fit the reality of urban society. Being deeply religious, she frequently used church music (gospel) as material for her arrangements. Her melodies were blues-inspired yet infused with European Romantic techniques.
