


LA FIOCCO MUSIC GROUP: Sunday, March 3, 3:00 pm

Please join us for our next Concerts@PCCT featuring the group La Fiocco. Since their founding, over 60 artists and 25 students coming from 10 states have performed with La Fiocco. For several, it was their first professional experience with a period instrument ensemble. La Fiocco's track record in providing opportunities for students and early-career musicians is exemplary, and it is in this spirit that they are delighted to have initiated their "The Next Generation" (TNG) project in the summer of 2023.

Take Up Your Cross, the Savior Said 718



Written by a nineteen-year-old in Connecticut, this challenging text has been widely printed on both sides of the Atlantic. It is strengthened by its resolute repetition of the same four words at the beginning of each stanza and by the appropriately stark shape note tune.

Will You Let Me Be Your Servant 727



The opening and closing stanza expresses the essence of this folk-style song about the mutuality of servant ministry: those who serve must also be willing to be served. This is what Christ intended when he commanded the disciples to "wash one another's feet" (John 13:14).



Perhaps because this hymn is so well known, its language sounds vaguely scriptural; but while there are various biblical uses of "stand" and "promise(s)," the two words are never combined. The confidence here is similar to that of "My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less" (see no. 353).
